





## TOY MONEY-BANK.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 506,619, dated October 10, 1893.

Application filed April 15, 1893. Serial No. 470,420. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:
Be it known that I, CHARLES A. BAILEY, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Cromwell, in the county of Middlesex and State of Connecticut, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Toy Money-Banks; and I do declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the 10 art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to letters of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

Figure 1 of the drawings is a vertical longitudinal section of box closed. Fig. 2 is a similar section of box open. Fig. 3 is a detail view in perspective. Fig. 4 is a vertical

transverse section on line x x.

This invention has relation to certain new and useful improvements in toy money banks or boxes, the object being to provide an attractive and amusing device for the reception of small coins, the insertion of which will be 25 attended with certain mechanical movements of images or figures placed upon the box or bank; and the invention consists in the novel construction and combination of parts, all as hereinafter specified and pointed out in the

Referring to the accompanying drawings, the letter A designates the box or receptacle, which, although shown as of oblong form, may be of any suitable and pleasing shape. 35 The surfaces of the box or receptacle may be ornamented by any attractive or appropriate design or configuration. Seated upon a raised portion a at one end of the said box or receptacle is a figure B, which may as shown 40 represent a man, although it may be made to represent any other desired object. At the opposite end of the box or receptacle is a second figure C, the foot portion of which is pivoted within the upper portion of the receptacle, by 45 a pin or pivot rod c, and connected to the foot of said figure within the receptacle is a spring D, the tension of which tends to hold the figure when free in an upright position. In normal position however, the said figure is 50 rocked over forwardly into a horizontal posi-

portion d in the upper portion of the receptacle. On the same pivot rod or pin with the figure is a cover E, which is made to close down over said figure when the latter is in 55 horizontal position, and when so closed, said cover forms a part of the upper portion of the receptacle. The cover is normally held closed by a small catch f, which engages with said cover, said catch f being carried by an 50 arm F of a rock shaft F', within the receptacle. A spring g bearing against an arm g' of said shaft and against the inner wall of the receptacle, holds said catch normally in position to engage said cover. At the rear por- 65 tion of said shaft is another arm H, which projects obliquely upward, and out through a slot h in the opposite side of the receptacle, terminating in a finger piece or  $\log h'$ . By pressing downwardly on this piece or  $\log h'$ , the shaft 70 F' is rocked sufficiently to release the catch f on the arm F from engagement with the cover The lower portion of the figure C, when in its horizontal position is inclosed in a guard K, which is supported within the upper portion 75 of the receptacle by lugs k' integral with the walls of the receptacle, said guard being slotted at l to permit the movement of the arm F of the rock-shaft.

In front of the figure B at the foot thereof, 80 a slot M is formed in the upper central portion of the receptacle, said slot being designed to receive a coin in edgewise position, the coin falling through said slot into a chute n in said guard. At the lower rear end of said 85 chute is a slot p through which the coin may

pass into the receptacle.

The operation is as follows:—A coin is dropped through the slot M into the upper portion of the chute n, but is prevented from 90 rolling down said chute into the receptacle by the forward edge of the cover E. The lug or finger piece h' is then depressed, actuating the rock-shaft, and releasing the catch f from engagement with the cover. The spring D 95 then acts upon the figure C, raising it with the cover into upright position, facing the figure B. The coin then rolls down the chute n and drops into the receptacle. In order that the figure C and its cover may move to- 100 gether, the foot of the figure has a bearing tion, and is partially received in a cut-away | against the end portion of the latter.

In the drawings, one arm P of the figure A is shown as pivoted to the figure, and a connection p is made between the pivot p' of said arm and the arm H of the rock-shaft F', so 5 that when the said shaft is operated to release the catch f, said arm of the figure will be thrown upwardly or extended.

The bottom plate of the box may be perforated if desired in order to permit inspec-

to tion of the interior.

Access to the box may be provided by making the box in separable sections, as shown, or in any other desired manner.

Having described this invention, what I 15 claim, and desire to secure by Letters Pat-

ent, is-

1. In a toy money box or bank, the combination with the box or receptacle, of the two figures at opposite ends thereof, one of said 20 figures being pivoted at its foot portion within said box or receptacle, a spring connected to said figure and acting to throw it and retain it in an upright position, a cut-away portion in the upper part of said box or receptacle to 25 receive said figure, the cover carried on the same pivot as said figure, the lock therefor, and means for releasing said lock, substantially as specified.

2. In a toy money box or bank, the combi-30 nation with a box or receptacle, of the figure pivoted at its foot portion within said box or receptacle, and adapted to be received in the upper portion of said box or receptacle, the cover carried by the pivot of said figure, its 35 lock, means for releasing said lock, and a spring arranged to throw said figure into upright position when said lock is released, substantially as specified.

3. In a toy money box or bank, the combi-40 nation with the box or receptacle, the pivoted

figure, the pivoted cover for said figure, the lock for said cover, and means for releasing said lock and for actuating said figure, of the guard plate within said box or receptacle, and the coin chute in said guard, said coverserv- 45 ing as a stop to prevent the coin from passing along said chute until said cover is released, substantially as specified.

4. In a toy bank, the combination with the box or receptacle, the pivoted figure Cadapt- 50 ed to normally lie within the upper portion of said box or receptacle in horizontal position, the spring arranged to throw said figure into upright position, a rock-shaft having an arm provided with a catch which normally 55 prevents said figure from being acted upon by said spring, and a second arm of said shaft projecting through the wall of said box or re-

ceptacle, substantially as specified.

5. A toy money box or bank, comprising a 60 box or receptacle, a figure at each end of said box, one of said figures being pivoted at its foot portion within said box, the pivoted cover for said figure, the catch for holding said cover and figure in horizontal position, the 65 spring connected to said figure and acting to throw it into upright position, the rock shaft having an arm carrying said catch, and a second arm projecting through a slot in the wall of said box or receptacle, the other of said fig-70 ures having a pivoted arm connected also with said rock shaft, substantially as speci-
