

## DESIGN FOR A TOY BANK.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 25,662, dated June 23, 1896.

Application filed May 18, 1896. Serial No. 592,066. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, Russel Frishe, a citizen of the United States, residing at Cromwell, in the county of Middlesex and State of Connecticut, have invented and produced a new and original Design for Toy Mechanical Banks, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, illustrating the same, in which—

Figure 1 is a perspective view of the bank. Fig. 2 is a front elevation of the same. Fig. 3 is a side view, and Fig. 4 is a rear elevation.

This invention has relation to a certain new and original design for toy mechanical banks; and it consists in the novel form and configuration of parts, all as hereinafter described, and illustrated in the accompanying drawings.

Referring to the drawings, it will be observed that the general form of the body of the bank is that of a tower, the lower portion or base A having its forward side designed to represent a rocky ledge or terrace a, with steps a' leading up the center of the same. From this terrace or base rises the tower B, the entire exterior of which, except as hereinafter specified, being designed to represent layers of

stone or brick b. The lower end of the tower is ornamented with a slightly-projecting band b', and its center and upper end with ornamental bands  $b^2$   $b^3$ , which give the appearance of upper and lower stories to the tower. The front of the tower is designed with the square projection C, the upper part of which is ornamented with the small balcony c, below which is the opening c', through which is the coins pass into the interior of the bank. The tower is ornamented on its several sides with the port-holes  $b^4$ .

An important feature of the design is the figure of a boy D, arranged at the front of the 40 tower, standing upon the terrace a, with an apple d upon his head, in such position that it will be struck by the coin which is fired into the opening c' by a mechanical toy figure of William Tell, which forms a part of this toy. 45

What I claim is—

The design for a toy bank substantially as herein shown and described.
